

Theft Charges for Lindsay Lohan?

While on set for a Lifetime movie, “Liz and Dick,” Lindsay Lohan became somewhat attached to a piece of jewelry that had been chosen for her to wear: a bracelet once owned by Elizabeth Taylor. Taylor had given it to her nurse, who then thought it would be a nice artifact for the movie. Several times throughout the shooting of the film, Lohan declared how much she loved the bracelet.

After the actress had visited her home, the nurse noticed that the bracelet had gone missing. At first, she gave Lohan “the benefit of the doubt,” assuming she had forgotten to take it off after trying it on. However, Lohan claimed she did not have the iconic piece of jewelry in her possession.

When the nurse threatened Lohan with the police, Lohan had one of her assistants return the bracelet a week later. While it seems unlikely that Lohan will be formally charged, as the bracelet has been returned, it is still quite possible that the actress will face consequences for her theft.

In Arizona, a person commits theft if, without lawful authority, they knowingly:

Convert for an unauthorized term or use services or property of another entrusted to the defendant or placed in the defendant’s possession for a limited, authorized term or use.
