


Global Situation Update: December 23, 2021

WHAT WE'RE WATCHING

Libya's national elections scheduled for 24 December 2021 are now delayed. Election officials say it is impossible to hold them with ongoing disputes over electoral law and armed militias massing. New dates may be announced soon, but the political and security environment will become more volatile in the coming weeks as the internationally backed peace process and fate of the interim government are in doubt.

A one-month delay to 24 January is most likely for the three major presidential candidates: former commander of the Libyan National Army (LNA) Khalifa Haftar, parliament speaker Aguila Saleh and interim Prime Minister Abdul Hamid Mohammed Dbeibah. Militias across the country are taking up positions near several strategic locations to intimidate candidates. Foreign business is not a target of these militias, but businesses operating on the ground are likely to face occasional and temporary operational disruptions.








Global

Globally, confirmed coronavirus cases topped 275.2 million with 5.3 million deaths; almost 8.3 billion vaccine doses have been administered.

- The antiviral drug remdesivir can help keep unvaccinated people at risk of severe COVID-19 out of hospitals, according to a study that found the treatment reduced hospitalization and death by 87 percent when given soon after diagnosis.
- Per new research to be published in Nature
 Medicine, artificial intelligence (AI) can predict with
 unprecedented accuracy whether a healthy person
 will get breast cancer, in an innovation that could
 seriously disrupt how scientists and doctors think
 about the disease.

Global

Getting a third dose of either Pfizer or Moderna's COVID-19 vaccine offers a "significant increase" in protection against the Omicron variant in elderly people, according to a Danish study.

Markets & Business

Amazon's cloud-computing operation Wednesday suffered its third outage in a month, briefly shutting down a vast number of online services critical to everyday life and highlighting again the vulnerabilities of an increasingly interconnected web.

- Royal Dutch Shell's Nigerian subsidiary SPDC has declared force majeure on exports of Nigerian Forcados crude oil after the obstruction of a tanker path by a malfunctioning barge.
- Wells Fargo & Co said it has delayed its plans for employees to return to the office. Bank of America Corp and Citigroup Inc are among banks that have recently told New York City employees they may work from home during the holidays.
- Fortum and German subsidiary Uniper unveiled plans to build two wind farms in Finland with a combined capacity of 380 megawatts.

- Australian clean energy company Ark Energy, owned Korea Zinc, will buy Epuron Holdings, acquiring 4.2 gigawatts of proposed wind and solar developments and a portfolio of sites with 4.8 GW of capacity, to help decarbonize its zinc metal processes and to power green hydrogen production.
- Intel has apologized for a ban on using components from Xinjiang in response to attacks from Chinese nationalist media, becoming the latest multinational in the crossfire in China's battle with the US over human rights issues.



Environment, Sustainability & Governance

UBS Asset Management has excluded Exxon Mobil and four other "unresponsive" energy companies from its climate aware range of funds, including one managed for UK pension scheme NEST.

- The US Department of Energy launched the Office
 of Clean Energy Demonstrations, which will
 support demonstration projects which aim to prove
 the effectiveness of new technologies at scale, in
 clean energy technologies including clean hydrogen
 and carbon capture.
- Russia's largest oil producer, Rosneft, said that its board had approved a new strategy aiming to hit net zero emissions by 2050.
- Azerbaijan's state energy firm SOCAR aims to achieve net zero carbon emissions in early 2022 in extracting oil and gas at its own sites.



Africa

 Nigeria destroyed nearly one million expired doses of AstraZeneca vaccine. African countries have long accused higher-income nations of donating vaccine doses that are too near expiration to distribute.

• The UN called for independent investigations following several reports of rape perpetrated by **Sudanese** security officials during anti-government protests.

 The Malawi parliament barred unvaccinated members of parliament from attending sessions.

• **Zambia** expects to agree a debt restructuring plan with creditors around the middle of next year after reaching a preliminary understanding for a program with the IMF.

The US is objecting to Turkish sale of armed drones to Ethiopia, noting "profound humanitarian concerns" over the sales, which could contravene US restrictions on arms to Addis Ababa. Turkey dismissed criticism that it plays a destabilizing role in Africa and has said it is in touch with all sides in Ethiopia to urge negotiations.



Asia

 Japan upgraded its growth projections for the next fiscal year starting in April, expecting GDP to hit a record even amid risks from the Omicron variant and supply constraints.

Ferdinand Marcos Jr., the son of late **Philippine** dictator, has emerged as
the clear favorite for next year's presidential election, taking more than a
20-point lead over his closest rival in polling.

South Korea and China will hold talks today at the Vice Deputy Foreign Minister

 level, first such meeting since June 2017, with talks exploring ways to reopen stalled denuclearization talks with North Korea and discuss other bilateral, regional and global issues.

Australia reintroduced COVID-19 curbs such as mandated mask wearing indoors, capacity limits and
 QR code check-ins to cover most of the population, one day after the Prime Minister ruled out a Christmas lockdown.

- **China** locked down 13 million people in the central city of Xi'an, as the country battles to contain coronavirus outbreaks that threaten its economic recovery in the run-up to the 2022 Winter Olympics; the lockdown is one of the most severe imposed in China since authorities restricted movement in Wuhan in early 2020.
- South Korea marked its deadliest day of the pandemic as social distancing curbs were reinstated to curb a sharp surge in the virus.



Europe

- Negotiators from Ukraine, Russia and the Organization of Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE) agreed to restore a full ceasefire between the Ukrainian government forces and Russia-backed separatists in eastern Ukraine.
- Germany took Russia's RT Deutsch off the air, days after the new German-language broadcast launched; German authorities ruled that it did not have the license it needed to operate in the country.
- France plans to launch litigation against the UK on post-Brexit fishing licenses in early January.
- Britain reported more than 100,000 new daily COVID-19 cases for the first time since widespread testing was introduced, representing a 59 percent increase over a week period.
- Spain will make it compulsory to wear a face mask outdoors again.
- Germany will impose limits on private gatherings, close night clubs and discos and ban spectators at football matches from December 28.
- Bulgaria is offering cash reward to boost vaccination rates among seniors.


Middle East

 The UN peacekeeping force in Lebanon, UNIFIL, denounced attacks against peacekeepers in southern Lebanon following videos of local residents throwing stones and defacing UN property.

 On a visit to Israel, US National Security Advisor Sherman assured Israel that the US is prepared to pursue "other options" to prevent nuclearization if Iran talks fall through.

 Russia and Turkey upped pressure on Syrian Kurds to engage with the Syrian government in Damascus amid a regional push to normalize with President al Assad.

- Compulsory vaccination for most public activities came into force in Tunisia.
- Libya's electoral commission proposed January 24 for delayed presidential polls, although experts are skeptical
 that date could be achieved.



Americas

• El Salvador reelected an attorney general that has spurred friction with the US over his decision to end a US-backed anti-corruption effort.

Peruvian protesters agreed to unblock a road used by a copper mine until December 30
after several weeks of protests against the lack of indigenous benefits for mineral
resources; it is unclear if the mine will restart operations in that window.

- Canada announced that it will expand programs to support people and businesses hit by COVID-19 ahead of an Omicron surge.
- Panama has detected its first case of the Omicron variant of COVID-19.




Americas: US

- The US has surpassed its summer Delta variant peak with the surge of Omicron variant infections. Dr. Fauci advised that Americans vaccinated and boosted against COVID-19 can be with family over the holidays but attending large gatherings is not safe, even for those who received a booster dose. California will require healthcare workers and workers in "high-risk congregate settings" to get a COVID-19 vaccine booster by February 1. New York reported more than 28,000 new COVID-19 cases, setting a record for daily cases for the fifth time in six days.
- National Hockey League to announce that its players will not participate in the Beijing Olympic Games because of Omicron infections among the team.
- US consumer confidence improved in December, suggesting the economy would continue to expand in 2022 despite a resurgence in COVID-19 infections and reduced fiscal stimulus. The Biden Administration extended the freeze on student loan repayments until May 1, moving the date back from February.
- The FDA authorized **Pfizer's antiviral pill** for use at home, making it the first authorized at-home treatment for COVID-19. However, the White House cautioned it will take more than six months to fulfil its initial order.
- The Supreme Court will hold a special hearing on January 7 to consider challenges to the Biden
 Administration's pandemic efforts to impose a nationwide vaccine-or-testing requirement for large employers
 and a separate coronavirus vaccine mandate for health-care workers.




The Omicron variant has arrived in the US, bringing with it a surprise COVID-19 wave that has prompted spiking case rates and new federal, state and local measures. In the last two weeks, COVID-19 positive rates have risen sharply across the country, driven by east coast hotspots. In major hotspots Washington, DC, and New York City, cases have increased 440 percent and 342 percent, respectively, since two weeks ago, leading smaller but still significant jumps in other major urban areas. As holiday travel ramps up, similar case rates are likely to spread throughout the country.






US COVID-19 7-Day Case Rate per 100,000, by State/Territory



Although climbing cases are currently concentrated in the east coast, community transmission is high throughout the country, and the surge has prompted the resumption of indoor mask mandates, virtual schooling, and other measures throughout the country. Washington DC reinstated its newly-lifted indoor mask mandate, while Boston (where cases have increased 72 percent in the last two weeks) will now require proof of vaccination for certain indoor businesses, including gyms. Meanwhile, Bloomberg reports that school closures have risen 82 percent throughout the country.

Level of Community Transmission of All Counties in US






How is community transmission calculated?



The rapid rise of positive case rates is widely attributed to the highly transmissible nature of the Omicron variant. Comprising less than one percent of cases in the US at the beginning of the month, Omicron accounted for at least 73 percent of sequenced virus samples in the US in the data set sending on December 18. The sharp increase reflects trends seen in other countries where Omicron has taken root (namely South Africa), driven by the extreme transmissibility of the variant.



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Despite alarming case rates, America's Omicron wave appears to be mirroring early observations that while highly transmissible, the variant is less likely to cause severe illness or death. New hospitalizations and deaths in the US have not risen as sharply as cases. While this may reflect the lag between infection (which has risen just in the last two weeks) and hospitalization or fatality, it would also mirror a similar trend in South Africa.



Daily new confirmed COVID-19 deaths per million people




7-day rolling average. Due to limited testing and challenges in the attribution of the cause of death, confirmed deaths can be lower than the true number of deaths.

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
Many scientists are predicting that the Omicron wave will peak in January, largely based on trends from South Africa, where the variant was first identified. South Africa's Omicron wave began in earnest in mid-November, and after hitting a pandemic high of 27,000 new cases on Thursday, December 16, new cases have fallen steadily since. If the variant follows the same path in the US, cases will continue to rise for the next 2-4 weeks before receding in mid- to late January.




Coronavirus Condition Updates
