On Wednesday, January 9, 2018, U.S. and Chinese trade officials concluded three days of intensive trade negotiations that were intended to reduce the on-going trade tensions between the United States and China. The talks reportedly saw the two sides moving closer on discrete issues in the energy and agriculture sectors but did not resolve continued disagreements over significant "structural" questions, such as the protection of intellectual property rights. The negotiations mark the first time trade officials have met since the two countries agreed to a temporary "truce" in the trade war between the countries in December 2018. More »
