Global Situation Update: March 24, 2021

WHAT WE'RE WATCHING

NATO member foreign ministers are meeting for the first time in-person since the start of the coronavirus pandemic. US Secretary of State Blinken is expected to meet with Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlüt Çavuşoğlu and yesterday called Ankara a "long-standing and valued ally."

However, it remains unclear how the Biden Administration will balance its enthusiasm for alliance-building with concerns over Turkey's human rights record, regional behavior, and acquisition of Russian S-400s.


Global

Confirmed coronavirus cases globally surpassed 124.1 million, with deaths at 2.7 million.

- The diagnostics chief at Roche said that rapid antigen tests will lose effectiveness at detecting COVID-19 as vaccinations rise.
- Pfizer has begun early clinical trials of an oral drug to treat COVID-19 at first sign of infection.
- Ships in the Suez Canal were being diverted to an older channel after a large container ship ran aground, blocking passage through one of the world's most important waterways. About 12 percent of world trade, by volume, passes through the canal connecting Europe and Asia.

Global

Globally, COVID-19 confirmed cases continued to rise for a fourth consecutive week, with just under 3.3 million new cases reported in the last week. Marked increases in the number of new cases were reported from the South-East Asia, Western Pacific, European and Eastern Mediterranean regions, all of which have been on an upward trajectory in recent weeks. Global deaths are also on the rise after six weeks of declines.







COVID-19 Vaccine

Russia has asked Covax to include the country's Sputnik V vaccine in its program to speed up development, manufacture and distribution of vaccines, especially to middle- and low-income countries.

- The European Commission will extend EU powers to potentially block vaccine exports to the UK and other regions with high vaccination rates.
- CureVac said that a study in mice suggests that its vaccine may be effective against the South African variant of the coronavirus.
- China's drug regulator approved an inhaled COVID-19
 vaccine candidate from CanSino Biologics for clinical trials.

- AstraZeneca said it will publish more data on its US clinical trial "within 48 hours" after the US National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases said it was concerned about the information initially released.
- Hong Kong authorities halted the use of a COVID-19
 vaccine developed by Pfizer and BioNTech citing "defective
 packaging," in what some observers believe to be a ploy to
 force reluctant residents to accept China's Sinovac Biotech
 vaccine.
- Vietnam became the 56th nation to approve the Sputnik V jab for emergency use.



Markets & Business

Turkey's money markets continue to face a liquidity squeeze, making it more difficult for foreign investors to hedge their exposure to the lira.

- Asian shares fell to a two-week low on Wednesday and the dollar neared four-month highs as coronavirus lockdowns in Europe and potential U.S. tax hikes worried investors.
- European stocks also hit a two-week low on Wednesday.
- The European Commission is set to clear Essilor Luxottica's €7 billion acquisition of GrandVision, a case that has worried antitrust investigators.
- A former oil trader at Glencore was charged with manipulation of fuel oil prices.

- The UK's Financial Conduct Authority warned that vulnerable younger people are engaging in "unsustainable" high-risk investing.
- The CEO of Citigroup told staff that the company will use a hybrid work model after the pandemic, expecting workers in the office only three days a week.



Africa

- Incumbent President Denis Sassou-Nguesso won a landslide reelection in the Republic of the Congo, extending his 36-year tenure for another 5 years.
- Ethiopian Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed said that "reports indicate that atrocities have been committed" in the Tigray region, acknowledging reports of war crimes in the region for the first time.
- UN officials warned that displacement from fighting in the Cabo
 Delgado region of Mozambique could reach 1 million.
- Sudan backed a UAE proposal to mediate the dispute over the Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam.







Asia

 US officials reported that North Korea fired two short-range missiles over the weekend.

Indian Prime Minister Modi wrote a goodwill letter to his
 Pakistani counterpart amid a thawing of relations.

 Thailand's cabinet approved \$11.3 billion in financial measures to aid pandemic-impacted businesses.

• Land prices in Japan dropped for the first time in 6 years due to the pandemic's impact.

• Australian authorities issued further flood warnings on Tuesday; floods have now affected around 10 million people across an area the size of Alaska.

Malaysia and Singapore are preparing for mutual recognition of vaccine certificates in order to revive cross-border travel. India will expand vaccine eligibility to all people over 45 in April. More than 13,000 national police officers in the Philippines have contracted COVID-19. Taiwan will help its handful of remaining diplomatic allies buy COVID-19 vaccines but on the condition that Taiwanese money is not used to obtain Chinese vaccines.

Europe

- Euro zone economic activity made a surprise return to growth this month
 as factories ramped up production to its fastest pace in over 23 years.
- Spain's central bank said the country could grow by as little as 3 percent in 2021, after a 11 percent contraction in 2020.
- Supporters of Russian dissident Alexei Navalny announced plans for a large street protest against the Kremlin in the spring.
- China summoned the EU's ambassador to protest the EU sanctions announced Monday. The EU's trade policy chief warned that China's decision to escalate a sanctions row risks imperiling a market-access deal meant to be the cornerstone of future relations between Brussels and Beijing.
- England's chief medical officer said that the chances of completely eliminating COVID-19 are "close to zero" and that the virus will be around for the foreseeable future, though it may be possible to bring the virus down to manageable levels. UK Prime Minister Johnson pledged to create a permanent memorial for those who died from COVID-19. After having closed theatres, shopping malls, hotels and cinemas last week Poland is considering imposing additional restrictions during the Easter holiday, with daily new infections continuing to mount. While the daily new case rate has dropped in Czechia, in per capita terms, it now has the highest cumulative death toll in the world, with 231 fatalities per 100,000 inhabitants. Ukraine recorded a record number of COVID-19 deaths for a second consecutive day.



Middle East

- France will reopen its embassy in the Libyan capital of Tripoli on Monday to show support for the country's new unity government.
- Iraq sent a formal request to the US to resume discussions on US troop levels. Iraq surpassed 800,000 virus cases.
- Russia asked Turkey to reopen three crossings in northern Syria to alleviate
 the humanitarian situation. The WHO announced plans to vaccinate 20 percent
 of the Syrian population by the end of 2021.
- Israeli Prime Minister Netanyahu's prospects for retaining power looked uncertain on
 Wednesday after partial results in the national election projected no clear path to victory.
 The Middle East quartet of mediators discussed reviving "meaningful negotiations"
 between Israel and the Palestinians with the aim of a two-state solution.
- Afghanistan's President Ghani will reportedly reject the US' peace plan but propose new presidential elections 6 months.
- Sheikh Hamdan bin Rashid Al Maktoum, Dubai's deputy ruler and the UAE's long-serving finance minister, has died.



Americas

- A new survey shows that 5 million **Mexicans** have dropped out of school over the past year, primarily because of COVID-19.
- In a tie-breaking vote, a Brazilian Supreme Court justice ruled that former Judge Sergio
 Moro, who went on to become President Bolsonaro's justice minister, treated former
 President Lula da Silva impartially in the investigation of his alleged graft. Brazil reported a
 record 3,251 COVID-19 deaths yesterday, as pot-banging protests erupted across the country
 during an address by President Bolsonaro in which he defended his pandemic response s.
- Guatemala City's airport closed Tuesday as volcanic ash from the eruption of the Pacaya volcano coated planes in the terminal.
- **Colombia** will impose new restrictions on movement and enact nightly curfews in municipalities with high occupancy levels in intensive care units as it tries to avoid a severe third wave of COVID-19.
- Canada's Manulife Vitality insurance program is offering perks like gift cards and hotel discounts to policyholders who get a COVID-19 vaccine.



Americas: US

 Nationally, 83.9 million people have received one or more vaccine doses, meaning more than one quarter of Americans are on the pathway to full vaccination. Next week, Texas will become the largest US state to make all adults eligible for vaccines.

 A letter signed by 250 New York City business leaders urged Albany not to raise taxes, saying that doing so could sent the city into a 1970s-level crisis.

- Sales of newly built homes fell to a 9-month low in February.
- Biden called for immediate action on gun control following the last week's mass shootings in Colorado and Georgia.
- Treasury Secretary Yellen said a **tax increase** would be needed to fund the next stages of President Biden's economic agenda.







Science Under the Scope: The Progress of COVAX

Global vaccine distribution is necessary to stamp out the pandemic, so COVAX's extensive reach makes it a key component to recovery. COVAX is the vaccination portion of an international partnership dedicated to ensuring equitable access to vaccines for COVID-19 known as the ACT Accelerator. It is run through the coordination of numerous intergovernmental and nonprofit agencies, including the World Health Organization.

There are two primary ways for COVAX to supply vaccines to low-income countries. The first is a mechanism that allows countries to buy into COVAX and, thus, secure vaccines for up to 50 percent of their population. The second mechanism provides discounted vaccines to low- and middle-income countries. Currently, 80 economies are utilizing the first mechanism and 92 are utilizing the second. These participating economies are home to 70 percent of the global population, demonstrating the extensive reach of COVAX.

To date, COVAX has secured 3.56 billion vaccine doses. The majority of these doses are of the Novavax vaccine, followed by doses of AstraZeneca and the Johnson & Johnson vaccines.³ COVAX is also supporting the development of nine vaccine candidates, including the Moderna and AstraZeneca vaccines.⁴

Vaccines qualify for COVAX distribution once they have been granted approval by WHO.⁵ The WHO so far has approved the Pfizer/BioNTech, AstraZeneca/Oxford, SII/AstraZeneca, and Janssen vaccines.⁶ Economies can also donate vaccines to COVAX for use in low- and middle-income countries. So far almost 16 million doses have been donated.⁷

When it comes to distributing the vaccine, there are two phases. The first phase focuses on providing vaccines to 20 percent of each partner country's population and the second phase focuses on extending coverage for populations at greater risk.⁸ COVAX plans to distribute 2.265 billion doses by the end of 2021.⁹ Approximately half of secured vaccines are destined for Southeast Asia and sub-Saharan Africa.



The Growing Toolkit for Global Human Rights Sanctions

Approximately half of secured vaccines are destined for Southeast Asia and sub-Saharan Africa. Almost four-fifths of vaccine doses to be distributed in 2021 are going to partners who will purchase them directly from COVAX and if executed, this would cover 28 percent of those populations.¹⁰ It is difficult at this point to predict how quickly and extensively the donated vaccines will reach low- and middle-income countries.

So far 50 out of the 172 partner countries have received just short of 30 million vaccine shipments through COVAX.¹¹ These doses account for 15 percent of all doses allocated through May of 2021. An additional 8.281 million doses have already been released for shipment and will shortly be dispersed among the six regions.¹²




A fourth wave is now evident in Europe, driven by outbreaks in Central and Eastern Europe. The region reported over 1.4 million new coronavirus infections, a 13 percent increase compared to the previous week. The UK variant is driving new outbreaks, with Poland reporting 80 percent of new cases of UK strain and Czechia 74 percent.

Daily new confirmed COVID-19 cases




Shown is the rolling 7-day average. The number of confirmed cases is lower than the number of actual cases; the main reason for that is limited testing.














Conditions have beginning to improve in Czechia and Slovakia, with new infections decreasing 18.9 and 18.7 percent, respectively.









European death rate ticked up 1 percent, with most countries still seeing declines. Italy, Poland, and Hungary are reporting concerning increases in the daily death toll.




In Europe, 104.47 million have received at least one dose of vaccine. The vaccination programs in the EU and Russia are struggling due to lack of supply and vaccine resistance.








