

Should I Contact a Premise Liability Lawyer if I Am Injured On Someone Else's Property?

The only thing that is true of every lawsuit is that it is different from every other lawsuit. Whether or not you should contact a [premise liability lawyer](#) depends upon the circumstances that you're dealing with. Understand that you at least have to be able to say that the following things are true in order to sue:

- You were injured
- Somebody else's negligence led to that injury
- You can put a dollar figure on that injury

Talking to an attorney is really the only way you can determine whether or not any of these things are true from a legal standpoint, but speaking to them is generally free. This is handled under a free consultation, provided you're working with an attorney that works on a contingency basis. Here are some of the things that they will help you work through.

Injuries

Injuries and damages are probably a little bit different from a legal standpoint than you think. For example, if somebody causes you an injury that means that you cannot go to work, the lost wages can be part of the damages that you seek. Pain and suffering are also things that can be sued over.

If you suffered a bad injury and it put you out of work, compromised your ability to earn in the future and impacted your quality of life, your attorney may recommend that you seek compensation for that.

Negligence

Attorneys that work with clients to help them seek compensation will work to establish how and why negligence played a part in their clients coming to harm. If someone invited you over for a pool party, for instance, and the surface near their pool was slippery, causing you to fall and crack your head, that person may be culpable for negligence. They invited you into a dangerous situation that they could have prevented by taking simple actions.

If you have been injured on someone else's property, contact an attorney. They may be able to help you get compensated for your pain and suffering, your medical expenses and more. The best way to figure out whether or not negligence was a factor is to sit down with an attorney. The consultation doesn't mean that you're taking them on as an attorney, so there's no risk involved and you're not obligated to them for just sitting down and letting them give you their initial advice based on your situation.

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
