

#### Struggling With Word - Under the Office Button

- Turn Formatting Marks Off (or On): Office Button > Word Options > Display
- Turn Off Auto Correct or Auto Format: Office Button > Word Options > Proofing
- Spell Check and Grammar Check Settings: Office Button > Word Options > Proofing
- Save Options: Office Button > Word Options > Save
  - Save Files in this Format select preferred default: .docx or .doc
  - o Auto-Recover: Dial this down to every 1 minute (Default is 10)
  - Default File Location: My Documents or Documents change as desired
  - Auto Recover File Location change as desired
- Drag/drop/cut/copy/paste options Office Button > Word Options > Advanced
  - Scroll down to "Display" and dial up number of Recent Documents
  - o Also under "Display" turn on "Show Shortcut Keys in Screen Tips"
- Warn before printing, saving, or sending a document with tracked changes or comments:
   Office Button > Word Options > Trust Center > Trust Center Settings > Privacy Options > Document-specific settings. Check the box:
  - Warn before printing, saving or sending a file that contains tracked changes or comments



# Struggling With Word - Weird Things are Happening


- My spacing is off Check <u>line</u> spacing <u>and</u> spacing <u>before and after</u>: Home > Paragraph.
   Many forms and templates use spacing before and after or exact line spacing (in lieu of single, 1.5, or double). To clean all odd-ball space settings out of your document, Select All using ctrl A, then Home > Paragraph in the ribbon and dial spacing before to 0, spacing after to 0, and line spacing to single (or whatever is desired).
- 2. I can't seem to manipulate a chunk of text See if keep with next, keep lines together, or widow/orphan control is on: Home > Paragraph.
- 3. In a numbered list, the number is bolded, but the text is not. I don't want <u>anything</u> to be bolded Word formatting characteristics are stored in the paragraph mark. Click Show/Hide ¶ to make the paragraph mark visible, select the ¶ mark and any space before it, then unbold.
- 4. I'm using a pleading template and I'm having trouble with the caption Captions in a pleading template are commonly set up in a Table. If this is the case, you'll need to manipulate the caption using Table settings. Click inside the caption, if Table Tools pops up in the top right of your Word screen, you've got a table. To manipulate table cells, click on the Layout tab. Other signs you're working with a table you'll see the cross-hair symbol or fields may be shaded:

5. When I click on text in my document, blue hash marks appear around it – This is a sign you are working with a text box. Click on the suspect text, Text Box Tools should pop up on the top right of your Word screen. Click on Text Box Tools to manipulate the text or adjust the text box. Here's an example of a text box:





#### Paste Special ...

If you choose "Unformatted Text," this command allows you to paste the contents of your clipboard into your document <u>without</u> formatting. The clipboard contents assume the formatting characteristics of your current document.

#### Insert File

This is another way you can bring content into an existing document without the formatting.

#### **Switch Windows**

Exactly what it says. I miss the old "Windows" menu option. This button lets me move quickly between Word documents.
