An Overview of Hypoxic Ischemic Encephalopathy

Long-term damage to the brain can result in developmental delays, cerebral palsy, learning impairments and other disabling complications. The child can face lifelong medical care and treatment.

Causes of Hypoxic Ischemic Encephalopathy

HIE in newborns is caused by complications during labor and delivery. Some of these are preventable and may lead to a medical professional being held liable through an Ohio birth injury claim.

Some of the causes of HIE may include:

- hypotension;
- umbilical cord complications;
- uterine rupture;
- prolonged delivery; and
- delay in C-section.

Any complication in which there is a lack of blood flow or oxygen to the brain can lead to HIE.

Some of these causes may be a result of medical negligence. When a healthcare professional fails to act in a safe manner or improperly performs a procedure, it could lead to you seeking help from a Cleveland birth injury attorney.

Symptoms of Hypoxic Ischemic Encephalopathy

In a newborn, some of the symptoms of HIE may include:

- extreme lethargy;
- seizures:
- no response to light;
- breathing difficulties; and
- coma.

Diagnosing HIE as quickly as possible is important. This can be done through an echocardiogram, CT scan, electrocardiogram or an MRI scan.

Treatment will depend on the severity of damage to the brain and whether there are other complications. Long-term treatment will depend on the extent of brain damage. A child could end up requiring a lifetime of medical care and services.

Damages Available in an Ohio Birth Injury Claim

If it can be established that medical negligence was the cause of your child's injuries, then you may be able to file an Ohio birth injury claim. You could be entitled to damages that address not only your current medical expenses, but also future ones.

If your child will require special educational services or rehabilitation, these costs may be included in your damages. You could also be entitled to damages that address pain and suffering, mental anguish, and reduced quality of life.

If HIE led to fatal injuries, then damages may be available that cover your medical bills, along with burial and funeral expenses. A Cleveland birth injury attorney will carefully consider all of the financial, physical and emotional losses that you and your child have suffered.
