### **ZTE Reaches New Settlement With US Government But Denial Order Remains In Place**

On June 11, the US Department of Commerce's Bureau of Industry and Security ("BIS") published a <u>superseding settlement agreement</u> with ZTE Corporation and ZTE Kangxun Telecommunications Ltd. ("ZTE") and an accompanying <u>superseding order</u>. The agreement replaces a March 2017 agreement between BIS and ZTE, which settled allegations that ZTE violated U.S. export controls and economic sanctions targeting North Korea and Iran. The new agreement will lift a seven-year Denial Order that BIS imposed on ZTE on April 15, 2018 for violating March 2017 agreement with BIS by making false statements to the agency. **More** »

The United Kingdom (the "UK") and the European Union ("EU") continue to negotiate an agreement outlining the terms of the UK's withdrawal from the EU. As a part of these negotiations, in December 2017, the UK and the EU agreed that there should be a "backstop" protocol that would go into effect if no agreement was reached by the parties concerning the treatment of the border between Ireland and Northern Ireland by the deadline for Brexit.
