


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WHAT WE'RE WATCHING

Today, the Colonial Pipeline is still not fully functional after it was shutdown by a ransomware cyber-attack. A prolonged shutdown could lead to fuel shortages and higher gas prices along the US East Coast. Airports across the region may also be affected as they generally only carry a few days worth of fuel.

Russian hacking group DarkSide issued a statement yesterday saying that it is apolitical and did not mean for the attack to cause widespread disruption. The US Government currently believes DarkSide is a criminal actor with no ties to the Russian government.





Global

Confirmed coronavirus infections topped 158.9 million with more than 3.3 million deaths.

The WHO declared the COVID-19 variant first detected in India, B.1.6.1.7, a "variant of concern," saying preliminary studies show it may be more transmissible than other variants. A study by Public Heath England found that B.1.6.1.7 has a "modest ability" to evade antibodies generated by the Pfizer vaccine, but that vaccines should still protect against severe disease.



COVID-19 Vaccine

The US FDA cleared the Pfizer vaccine for use in children age 12-15.

- Novavax pushed back its timeline and now says it will apply for regulatory approval of its COVID-19 vaccine in the UK, US and Europe in the third quarter of this year. Novavax said Monday that a vaccine it is developing which targets COVID-19 and flu has produced a positive immune response to both viruses.
- France's health minister said that the country will "probably not" expand the use of AstraZeneca vaccines to people below the age of 55.

 In the opening of the lawsuit against the pharmaceutical company over delayed supplies, the EU wants AstraZeneca to deliver at least 120 million doses of its vaccine by the end of June.




COVID-19 Vaccine

Globally, 1.32 billion doses of vaccine have been administered.

The impact of vaccination programs is beginning to be reflected in a decrease in daily new cases and the overall number of active cases. This trend is most evident in the US and Europe where a greater share of the population has been vaccinated.

Markets & Business

Attorneys general from 44 US states urged Facebook to drop plans to pursue a version of Instagram for children.

- Australia's S&P/ASX 200 index hit a record high Monday, setting the country's first pandemic-era stock record.
- The **British pound** jumped to a 3-month high following a series of election victories for the ruling Conservative party.
- Startup mortgage lender Better Holdco Inc plans to go public by merging with a SPAC sponsored by investment firm Novator Capital, in a deal that values the company at about \$7 billion.

- **BioNTech** beat expectations with Q1 earnings, swinging to a profit on sales of its Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine.
- Ikea donated €3 million to Doctors Without Borders to help fight COVID-19 in India.
- Yamaha Motor will suspend production at two motorcycle plants in India due to the country's outbreak.

Africa

- The ruling **South African** ANC party appointed a new secretary general, days after a power struggle in which the former secretary general, accused of corruption charges, refused to recognize his suspension.
- The **Ivory Coast and Burkina Faso** announced intentions "*mutualize*" their anti-jihadist operations, expanding intelligence sharing and operational cooperation.
- Portugal announced plans to send a further 60 troops to Mozambique for a training mission to aid the country's anti-Islamist campaign.





Asia

- The Indian government has warned doctors to look for signs of mucormycosis or "black fungus" in COVID-19 patients amid a rise in reports of the rare infection. India surpassed 250,000 reported virus deaths, with experts warning the death toll is significantly higher.
- Malaysia will be imposing a nationwide lockdown, called a "movement control order" from May 12 to June 7 as COVID-19 case numbers spike. Malaysia's defunct state fund, 1MDB, is suing JPMorgan, Deutsche Bank, and Coutts for almost \$3 billion in alleged losses from involvement in the fund's corruption scandal.
- **Nepali** Prime Minister Oli lost a confidence vote, prompting a new formation attempt; the party lost its coalition after splitting with its Maoist wing in March.
- Japan's Prime Minister Suga looks set to wait until autumn to call an election as the opposition gave up on a no-confidence vote that could have forced earlier polls.
- The **Taiwanese** Foreign Ministry said they would "*fight to the last minute*" for a seat at the upcoming WHO meeting, while **China** said there is no room for compromise. Taiwan's President Tsai offered to work with the **EU** to boost supplies of semiconductors.
- In the two weeks since ASEAN declared a five-point consensus on **Myanmar** and called for violence to cease, the military junta has killed 32 people and arrested 437 more.

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Europe

- UK Prime Minister Johnson announced the next steps for easing England's lockdown: from May 17, groups of up to six may meet inside, groups of up to 30 can meet outside, restaurants can open indoor dining, museums and cinemas can reopen, and all university students will be able to return to campus.
- Union officials are urging the **UK** government to raise public sector wages, rather than the constrained pay policy set by the Treasury.
- The EU is readying a fourth round of sanctions against Belarusian President Lukashenko, to take effect in June.
- The EU's home affairs commissioner called for a better mechanisms to handle migrant arrivals, and for bloc members to "show solidarity" with Italy by accepting some refugees following a marked uptick in arrivals over the weekend.



Middle East

- The UAE and Bahrain established a travel corridor for vaccinated travelers.
- The UAE and Kuwait suspended entry for travelers from Sri Lanka,
 Pakistan, Bangladesh and Nepal.
- Saudi Arabia will require visitors to quarantine for one week.
- **Iran** publicly confirmed that it has engaged in talks with **Saudi Arabia** for the first time, saying that de-escalation is in the region's interest.
- A **US** Coast Guard ship fired 30 warning shots at an **Iranian** IRGC ship after it came too close in the Strait of Hormuz.
- Lockheed Martin removed its contractors from Balad base in Iraq after recent attacks on US infrastructure, a significant drawdown.

- Hamas claimed that more than 100 rockets had been fired from Gaza into Israel, and the Israel fired rockets in Gaza, reportedly killing 9. The exchange follows several days of Israeli-Palestinian clashes in eastern Jerusalem over forced evictions of Palestinian families in which over 200 Palestinians were hurt, per the Red Crescent. Jordanians staged solidarity protests against violence at al Aqsa Mosque.

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Americas

- Argentina confirmed its first cases of the Indian and South African variants. Argentina is struggling to contain its current outbreak, reporting between 15,000 to 25,000 daily new cases since April 6.
- An internal document found that **Venezuelan** state oil company PDVSA would need \$58 billion in investment to return its oil production to pre-1998 levels.
- **Colombian** President Duque vowed to address issues raised by youth protesters and meet with strike leaders in Bogota, following over a week of anti-government protests and weekend violence against protesters.
- The AFL-CIO filed the first motion for the US government to bring a labor complaint against Mexico, as allowed under the trade deal that replaced NAFTA, alleging that Mexican workers at an auto parts plant were denied union representation.



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Americas: US

- Across the nation, 152.8 million people have received at least one dose of vaccine, representing 46 percent of the total population. New COVID-19 infections in the US fell to their lowest level in 11 months over the weekend. US air travel set a new pandemic-era record on Mother's Day, as the TSA screened 1.71 million passengers.
- The Biden Administration will begin distributing \$350 billion to state and local governments this month but has specified that the money should be used on pandemic-related costs or new infrastructure projects, not tax cuts. California Governor Newsom proposed a \$100 billion economic stimulus plan that would triple the state's direct cash payments to some two-thirds of residents.
- President Biden pushed back on the assertion from a number of Republicans and business groups that enhanced **unemployment benefits** are discouraging Americans from working.
- The Pentagon is considering ending its **JEDI cloud-computing project** amid a lawsuit from Amazon.
- Top **House Republicans** scheduled a Wednesday vote on removing Rep. Cheney (R-WY), who voted to certify the 2020 election, from her leadership positions.
- The **Colonial Pipeline** remained closed for the fourth day; the White House said that there is no evidence of Russian involvement.

China Bulletin: Counterweights to the Belt and Road Initiative

Over recent months a number of geopolitical overtures have taken aim at China's Belt and Road Initiative (BRI), demonstrating a will in the west to provide counterweights to President Xi's flagship foreign policy initiative. Though the pace of new projects has been slowing down in recent years, a trend accelerated by the COVID-19 pandemic, scrutiny of BRI is at a high, driven both by political suspicion towards Beijing and concerns about environmental standards and debt sustainability for BRI projects.

Upsets such as Australia's decision in April to cancel two BRI deals because they were found "*inconsistent with Australia's foreign policy*" underline the stakes of pushing back on the BRI for countries involved – already strained ties between Canberra and Beijing entered a further tailspin, with China "*indefinitely*" suspending all activity under a China-Australia Strategic Economic Dialogue. Though many top western powers are not part of the BRI themselves (with the notable exception of a number of EU member states), growing attention to the initiative has resulted in steps from both the EU and US, working with partners like India and Japan, to develop their own joint infrastructure development projects as alternatives to the BRI.

New Momentum for EU-India Cooperation

As western nations have grown increasingly uneasy with China's growing global projects, India has steadily drawn interest as a potential counterweight to China – particularly since tensions flared on the China-India border in spring 2020, giving India all the more reason to be wary of its neighbor. The most recent effort to build on cooperation with India can be seen in EU-India talks to build joint infrastructure projects around the world, with concerns about China serving as the often-unspoken motivation to renew cooperation. India's efforts to maintain neutrality in its international engagements mean that statements from joint talks with India will often avoid direct mention of contentious political issues or branding efforts as a

a counter to the BRI. The EU, however, has been more direct in its framing of efforts as countering China. In late April, when diplomats reported the India and the EU were in talks about joint global infrastructure efforts, one EU diplomat expressed that: *"there is now a window of opportunity to team up and create the environment for a globalization based on partnership that would be more attractive than what China can offer."*

On May 8, the EU held its first ever summit of all 27 EU leaders with India's Prime Minister Modi, in a further sign of interest in deepening ties. At the summit, the two parties agree to resume negotiations for a trade agreement, which were previously frozen in 2013. The EU and India also agreed to collaborate on building joint international infrastructure projects, notably in Africa, where China's deep engagement has prompted growing unease in western capitals. The renewal of ties with India comes after the EU reached a 2019 accord with Japan, which was also seen as an effort to build alternatives to the BRI. However, attention to the summit was largely overshadowed by India's disastrous current COVID-19 outbreak. Ultimately, only time will tell how successful this new attempt at

deepening EU-India ties will be; many of the issues that causes trade talks to collapse in 2013 remain as obstacles, and Prime Minister Modi has come under increasing criticism in Europe over accusations of crackdown on political freedoms and violation of human rights. While shared concerns about China's global reach change the geopolitical calculus of deepening ties, they do not automatically make the two partners more compatible.

Infrastructure Plans from the US and Japan

In mid-April, Japanese Prime Minister Suga became the first world leader to visit the Biden White House. Though a key signal of the importance the Biden Administration puts on the US-Japan alliance, the outcomes of the visit largely went under the radar of media attention. The two leaders launched a new "Competitiveness and Resilience (CoRe) Partnership" to bolster bilateral economic collaboration. Along with recovery from the pandemic and climate change, the CoRe partnership will focus on "Competitiveness and Innovation" including advancement of *"secure and open"* 5G networks (the US committed \$2.5 billion and Japan \$2 billion to 5G

initiatives alone), cooperation on sensitive supply chains like semiconductors, and efforts to "build on successful US-Japan cooperation in third-countries and launch a Global Digital Connectivity Partnership to promote secure connectivity."

Many of these objectives have been prioritized due to concerns about China, even where official statements did not expressly frame them as such. The CoRe partnership's focus on key BRI areas like 5G and official rhetoric focusing on environmental and sustainability factors show how the effort, even if not officially billed as such, is set to counterbalance the BRI.

Given the strategic importance the Biden Administration puts on the Indo-Pacific, US-led efforts to counter, or provide alternatives to, China's BRI investment are likely to concentrate on Asia. Japan, as the world's third-largest economy, a country with a strong infrastructure-building history, and a top investor in projects across Asia will be central to any US-led efforts to provide alternatives to the BRI. It will take time to see the impact of new US-Japan efforts in Asian infrastructure, but these early meetings give a clear indication of key spaces to watch, including the battleground of

telecommunications infrastructure (namely 5G) and the emphasis on environmental commitments in drawing contrast to China.


If tensions continue to rise over China's BRI projects overseas – and more investments come in from the like of EU-India or US-Japan joint initiatives – the issue area could become a lot more tense for third countries where they are playing out, creating new arenas for political competition to shape development efforts. On the other hand, competition to build needed infrastructure could help provide more countries with more option - and better-quality ones. The drive to counterbalance China's Belt and Road Initiative could hasten efforts in countries like the US to rebalance more foreign spending towards economic aid, as the message of competing with China joins calls from domestic political groups to reassess international military investments. While it will take years to see how today's pledges and dialogues turn into concrete infrastructure projects, interest in the idea of creating more alternatives to the BRI is likely to continue growing. The issue is set to be revisited in a broader international forum at the G7 meeting this June, which will be hosted by the UK and includes invitations for Australia, India and South Korea to attend.

As of 2100 hours US EDT on May 10, 2021




Confirmed Cases (New)




