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WHAT WE'RE WATCHING

The health of Russian anti-corruption activist Alexey Navalny is in decline, with reports indicating that he has been subjected to "torturelike" conditions in prison. Navalny's status during his 2.5 year prison sentence on politically motivated charges will be of elevated concern to US and European lawmakers, who may impose additional punitive measures on Moscow should the activist die in captivity. The situation is reminiscent of Sergei Magnitsky, whose death in 2009 triggered the passage of the Magnitsky Act, authorizing the US government to sanction those it sees as human rights offenders.





Global

Confirmed coronavirus cases surpassed 127.6 million with deaths at 2.7 million.

- Traffic in the Suez Canal resumed after the Ever Given was re-floated. Shipping companies say the backlog from days of stopped traffic could take weeks or months to clear.
- Leaders of 23 countries and the World Health Organization on Tuesday backed an idea to create an international treaty that would help the world deal with future health emergencies.



COVID-19 Vaccine

A CDC study confirmed that Pfizer and Moderna vaccines are highly effective in preventing COIVD-19 infection; in a group of about 4,000 essential workers, risk of infection fell by 80 percent after one shot and 90 percent after two shots.

- **Canada** suspended use of the **AstraZeneca vaccine** for under-55s as a "*precautionary measure*" while health authorities investigate possible concerns about blood clots raised in Europe.
- US business groups, including pharma industry lobbyists, are urging the Biden administration to resist pressure from developing nations to suspend intellectual property protections for COVID-19 vaccines.
- British drugmaker GlaxoSmithKline will manufacture up to 60 million doses of vaccine developed by pharma rival Novavax in an agreement set to boost UK production of coronavirus doses.
- **Palestinians** received 100,000 doses of China's Sinopharm vaccine from Beijing.
- **Britain** will vaccinate the whole of its adult population before it provides any surplus doses to other countries, including close neighbor Ireland.

COVID-19 Vaccine

Globally, 564.56 million have received vaccinations.

With the supply chain to the Covax facility disrupted due to India's decision to prioritize domestic requirements, countries in Africa risk falling further behind in the global race for COVID-19 vaccination. Africa makes up less than 2 percent of vaccine administered around the globe thus far. 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Markets & Business

Global banks may lose more than \$6 billion from the collapse of Archegos Capital.

- Asian share markets strengthened Tuesday as investors remained focused on gains in the global vaccination program.
- European shares edged toward all-time highs on Tuesday on hopes of a strong economic recovery,
- The **UK pound** rallied to a 13-month high against the euro, which is on track to see its worst month since 2019.
- Vote counting for a worker's union at an **Amazon** warehouse in Alabama will begin today; if the union is approved, it will be the first union at a US Amazon facility.
- **News Corp** will buy **Houthon Mifflin Harcourt**'s consumer publishing arm for \$349 million.

- South Korea's **Hyundai Motor Co** said on Tuesday it plans to temporarily suspend production at its Ulsan No.1 plant due to chip and component supply issues from April 7-14.
- **T-Mobile** is scaling down its TV-service plans and will instead direct customers towards YouTube TV.
- **Foxconn**, the world's largest contract electronics maker, posted on Tuesday a lower Q4 profit that lagged expectations despite strong iPhone 12 sales.
- UK satellite company **Inmarsat** sued the Dutch government after it was told to relocate so that telecoms companies can use its spectrum for 5G.

Africa

- Mozambican security forces reportedly largely recaptured the town of Palma, where militants had taken control of the small port and Total oil facility. The Islamic State claimed credit for the attack. The US assessed that the Palma attack was a sign of increasing "brazenness" of the Islamic State.
- After passing 200,000 virus infections, Ethiopia tightened COVID-19 restrictions.
- The International Criminal Court will rule on Wednesday whether to uphold the acquittal
 of Ivory Coast's former president Laurent Gbagbo, the first head of state to stand trial
 at the tribunal. Gbagbo and his former youth leader Charles Ble Goude were cleared of
 crimes against humanity in 2019 over a wave of post-electoral violence in the west
 African nation more than a decade ago.
- Coronavirus restrictions have exacerbated hunger in urban Zimbabwe, where at least 2.4 million people are now struggling to meet basic food needs, according to the UN World Food Program assessment.

Asia

- The US suspended all trade agreements with Myanmar until the democratically elected government returns to power. Myanmar protesters launch "garbage strike," asking residents to leave garbage at main road intersections, as death toll tops 500
- The Philippines returned Manila to its strictest lockdown level after surpassing 10,000 new cases in one day for the first time. Bangladesh surpassed 600,000 infections.
- The defense ministers of Japan and Indonesia agreed to conduct joint exercises in the South China Sea, following tensions over the presence of a Chinese *"maritime militia"* in the Spratly Islands.
- A UN working group said that a number of "*well-known global brands*" may be involved in human rights abuses in Xinjiang, China. Huawei suspended downloads of Nike and Adidas apps from its app store amid a continuing backlash over their positions on Xinjiang. Finnish paper company Storna Enso said it will divest from the viscose market, a move that follows media reports of possible links between the company and forced labor in Xinjiang.

Europe

- The **Belarusian** government opened a criminal case against opposition leader Svetlana Tsikhanouskaya on the charges of preparing for a terrorist act.
- Slovak Prime Minister Matovic will resign on Monday, becoming the first world leader to step down over a COVID-19 controversy. The president will task Finance Minister Heger with forming a new government.




- British Prime Minister Johnson said he hopes to avoid another lockdown in the UK. Following a significant rise in case rates, **Turkey** tightened virus-related restrictions, including a return to weekend lockdowns. Over the past week, Turkey average more than 30,000 daily new infections. **Hungary** surpassed 20,000 deaths.
- The **Irish** government unveiled its "*Our Rural Future*" strategy, which will leverage changed working patters to to shift people from major cities to the rest of the country, envisaging a network of remote working hubs and rejuvenated town centers in an effort to redress the country's longstanding rural-urban divide.
- **Turkey's** president Recep Tayyip Erdogan fired the deputy governor of the central bank, 10 days after he dismissed its head, sparking fears the country was heading for a return to unorthodox monetary policy.

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Middle East

- Israeli President Rivlin will start discussions with political parties on Monday to determine the preferred candidate to try to form a government and invite one to build a coalition by April 7.
- French Foreign Minister le Drian warned Lebanese leaders that the EU is exploring ways to exert pressure on Lebanese actors who have obstructed efforts to form a new government.
- The **US** urged the **UN Security Council** to call for the reopening of **Syrian** border crossings currently controlled by **Russi**a.
- Israel added the UAE and Bahrain to a list of countries it advises Israeli citizens to avoid visiting due to a heightened risk of Iranian attack.





Americas

- **Brazilian** President Jair Bolsonaro made six Cabinet changes on Monday in the biggest ministerial reshuffle since he took office as pressure mounts on the far-right leader over his handling of the pandemic that has killed over 300,000 in the country. Bolsonaro replaced the foreign minister, minister of defense and minister of justice.
- Guatemala declared a "state of prevention" along its border with Honduras amid reports of a new migrant caravan forming there.
- Over the weekend, Mexico City's small-particle pollution rose to levels not seen in years, about six times of what is considered the acceptable limit. Mexico's President Lopez Obrador condemned the killing in police custody of a Salvadoran woman, whose death, recorded on video, has sparked public outrage.
- **Chile's** President Piñera said that Congress should delay elections for delegates to the country's constitution assembly from April 10-11 to May 15-16.

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Americas: US

- Nationally, 95 million people have received one or more vaccine doses, 28.6 percent of the total population. CDC director Walensky expressed a sense of "*impending doom*" about a resurgence of coronavirus in the country. New coronavirus cases continued to rise this week, jumping by as much as 12 percent nationwide. Michigan led with a 57 percent rise over the past week. New Jersey surpassed 900,000 infections. The death toll now exceeds 550,000. The Biden Administration will add further vaccine sites to speed nationwide immunization. New York opens vaccine eligibility to all residents over 30 starting today.
- The CDC extended its national eviction moratorium for three months. The number of Americans filing for bankruptcy last year was down 22 percent compared to 2019, while commercial bankruptcies rose 29 percent.
- Progressive Senate Democrats indicated that their plans for a **capital-gains at death tax** should come with a \$1 million per-person exemption.
- The White House released an ambitious plan to expand wind farms along the East Coast and jump-start the country's nascent offshore wind industry as part of an expanded green energy program.
- The White House said that President Biden does not plan to meet with **North Korean** leader Kim Jong Un. The Biden Administration is preparing to issue guidelines that would make it easier for US diplomats to meet **Taiwanese** officials, in a move China is likely to see as a provocation.

Two months after the February 1st military coup, instability and violence continues to worsen in Myanmar. Last Saturday, March 27th, saw the deadliest day since the coup, with security forces killing at least 114. The scale of violence and brutality of tactics by Myanmar's security forces have further hardened opposition to the military leadership, both within the country and internationally. Activists, pro-democracy politicians, and ethnic armed forces have echoed calls for a united front against the military junta, increasing risk of escalating violence between opposition groups and security forces willing to use deadly force.

Heightened Violence and Risk of Further Escalation


On Saturday, at least 114 were killed by security forces as the Tatmadaw (Myanmar's military) celebrated Armed Forces Day, bringing the country's known death toll since the coup to over 450. Given tight control on information coming out of Myanmar and the prevalence of internet suspensions since the coup, the real death toll is likely higher. Saturday demonstrated an escalation not only for the scale of deaths, but also of the Tatmadaw's tactics for crackdown on dissent. Along with using live ammunition against protestors, reports have highlighted brutal tactics used to intimidate protestors and the communities that might support them, including use of arbitrary arrests, beatings by police, shootings of bystanders (including a number of children), and neighborhood raids.

Given the levels of violence used by security forces over the past two months, any de-escalation of protests and government crackdown is unlikely to last. Rather, the country risks entering a vicious circle of escalating violence; the most recent violent crackdown raises the potential for civilian attacks against security personnel and property, which could in turn prompt elicit disproportionate retaliation. Though most deaths have been concentrated in Myanmar's two largest cities, Mandalay and Yangon, violence has been recorded across the country. If violent attacks do continue to intensify, the anti-coup protest movement could gain more traits of an organized armed resistance – particularly depending on the role of existing armed ethnic groups.

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Ethnic Armed Forces in Myanmar

The intensifying violence of the past few days has drawn increased attention to Myanmar's ethnic armed forces, with multiple armed groups, opposition politicians, and prodemocracy activists calling for a unified front to resist Tatmadaw rule. The Committee Representing Pyidaungsu Hluttaw (CRPH), a parallel administration set up by allies of Aung San Suu Kyi, says it has reached agreement with major ethnic groups on the need to form a unity government. The CRPH's appointed Special Envoy to the UN, Dr. Sasa, explained that the administration is working with several ethnic groups on forming a new constitution, with a new "unity government" to be formed in April. Following Saturday's violence, the General Strike Committee of Nationalities, a prominent protest group, published an open letter on Facebook calling for "the ethnic armed organizations to collectively protect the people." The Restoration Council of Shan State/Shan State Army – South (RCSS), which operates near the Thai

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border, became the latest ethnic armed group to warn that Myanmar's armed ethnic factions will not stand by if more continue to be killed.

Conflict between the Tatmadaw and ethnic armed groups has not been limited to rhetorical warnings. Skirmishes between government security forces have already sparked alarm and international headlines such as: *"Myanmar Civil War Fears Growing After Airstrikes on Ethnic Army*." The Karen National Union, which controls an area in Myanmar's southeast along the Thai border, on Monday confirmed reports that the Tatmadaw conducted retaliatory airstrikes against them, which killed three people and caused about 10,000 to flee to a new safe zone. In the north, the Kachin Independence Army, which has also warned the government against crackdown on protestors, and which has skirmished with Tatmadaw forces multiple times since the coup, reportedly attacked police battalions in Kachin state on Sunday – killing about 20 policemen, according to *Myanmar Now*.

The Tatmadaw has reached out to various ethnic armed groups in efforts to forestall the creation of a united front. Amid Saturday's

violence, Tatmadaw leader Min Aung Hliang also reiterated his promise to protect the country's people and democracy. But the military is unlikely to succeed in dissuading action against them as long as they continue crackdowns on resistance – even if the chances of an armed insurgency succeeding against the Tatmadaw are low.

International Reactions and Reputational Risk

Saturday's violence met with swift condemnation from numerous Asian, North American, and European nations, intensifying criticism that had already been leveled at the military junta. The UN's Special Rapporteur for Myanmar described the military's actions as "*mass murder.*" On Monday, US Trade Representative Katherine Tai announced that the US will suspend all trade engagement with Myanmar until a democratically elected government returns, while Norway urged all of its citizens to leave the country. Not all countries have been so severely critical of the Tatmadaw – China, India and Russia all had representatives attending the Armed Forces Day celebration, and China responded to the day's violence with reiterated calls for de-escalation from all sides. But Myanmar's

trajectory towards a prolonged period of political instability and continuing violence is certain to bring heightened reputational and sanctions exposure risks for entities involved in the country.

For Myanmar's neighbors, the country's worrying trajectory brings risk of conflict spilling across long and sometimes porous international borders. Thailand's Prime Minister said Monday that his government is preparing for an influx of refugees from Myanmar; already tensions have arisen over reports that Thai authorities forced back over 2,000 refugees fleeing airstrikes on Monday. With no end in sight for Myanmar's instability, refugee flows from the country of 54 million may be only just beginning.




Coronavirus Condition Updates

As of 2100 hours US EDT on March 29, 2021




Confirmed Cases (New)




