Climate Policy Update August 15, 2022

Good evening! This is Akin Gump's <u>weekly policy newsletter</u> on **climate change** policy and regulatory developments, providing information on major climate policy headlines from this past week and forthcoming climate-related events and hearings:

- <u>Biden-Harris Administration Launches \$675 Million Bipartisan Infrastructure Law Program to Expand Domestic Critical</u> <u>Materials Supply Chains</u> (Department of Energy Office of Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy) The Biden-Harris administration released a request for information regarding the Critical Materials Research, Development, Demonstration and Commercialization Program, which was provided \$675 million in funding from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law.
- <u>Amid Fight with Oil Industry, Newsom Makes a Last-Minute Pitch to Harden California's Climate Goals</u> (Los Angeles Times) Gov. Gavin Newsom (D-CA) released a five-point plan which calls on "lawmakers to enact more aggressive targets on state laws that reduce greenhouse gases and increase the use of renewable energy." Additionally, the proposal seeks to establish health and safety buffer zones around new oil and gas wells.
- <u>California Energy Commission Adopts Historic California Offshore Wind Goals, Enough to Power Upwards of 25</u> <u>Million Homes</u> (*California Energy Commission*) The California Energy Commission adopted "a report establishing offshore wind goals." More specifically, the report set goals of producing 3,000 to 5,000 megawatts of offshore wind by 2030.
- <u>Calif. Governor Gives Lifeline to State's Last Nuclear Plant</u> (*E&E News*) Gov. Newsom proposed legislation to keep California's "last nuclear power plant open five to ten years beyond its planned 2025 final closure date." The Governor's spokespeople noted that the extension of the nuclear power plant is necessary as "climate impacts are hitting faster than expected."
- <u>Congress Just Passed a Big Climate Bill. No, Not That One.</u> (The Atlantic)
 On Tuesday, President Biden signed the CHIPS and Science Act into law. In addition to incentivizing semiconductor production, the measure "could direct an estimated \$67 billion, or roughly a quarter of its total funding, towards accelerating the growth of zero-carbon industries and conducting climate-relevant research."
