Wrongfully Convicted of Murder, Tennessee Board of Parole Recommends Adam Braseel to be Exonerated

On June 24, 2020, The Tennessee Board of Parole voted unanimously to recommend that Gov. Bill Lee exonerate Adam Braseel, who spent a dozen years in prison for a killing he's always maintained he did not commit.

Following a nearly seven-hour hearing led by Nashville partner Alex Little and associate Zack Lawson, the Tennessee Board of Parole voted unanimously to recommend that Governor Bill Lee exonerate Braseel.

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New Supreme Court Ruling Allows Religious Employers to Exempt Birth Control from Health Care Coverage

On July 8, 2020, the Supreme Court ruled that employers may exclude coverage for birth control from their health plans based upon moral or religious objections to contraception.

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President, Congress Extend Application Period for PPP Loans

On July 4, President Trump signed into law a bill extending the period during which borrowers can apply for paycheck protection program ("PPP") loans from June 30 to August 8. The PPP loan program is part of the governmental response to the adverse economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic upon small businesses.

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DOL Cracks Open the Door for Private Equity in 401(k) Plans

The U.S. Department of Labor (the "DOL") recently released an information letter that concludes, if certain conditions are met, a plan fiduciary will not violate his fiduciary duties under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, as amended ("ERISA") by offering a "professionally managed asset allocation fund with a private equity component as a designated investment alternative for an ERISA covered individual account plan."

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PPP Borrowers Can Apply for Forgiveness Early

In a recent interim final rule, the Small Business Administration ("SBA") clarified that borrowers of paycheck protection program ("PPP") loans could apply for loan forgiveness prior to the end of a borrower's covered period if the borrower had already used all the PPP loan proceeds. Generally, a borrower's covered period is either 8 weeks, if the borrower obtained the PPP loan prior to June 5, 2020 and chooses not to use the longer 24-week period, or 24 weeks, in the case of any other borrowers, from the date of loan disbursement.

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Latest Executive Order Restricts Work Visas

On June 22, 2020, President Trump issued a Presidential Proclamation restricting foreign nationals from entering the United States on certain temporary work visas. Just two months earlier, on April 22, 2020, the administration temporarily suspended the entry of most foreign nationals seeking to enter the United States as Lawful Permanent Residents (also known as Green Card holders).
