There are inevitably inexperienced rookies in the ranks of the IRS who might overlook something in the tax code or misunderstood certain details in your tax return. A competent tax professional would be able to pick out areas where he can reverse the stand taken by the tax agent on the basis of the tax code, providing more documentation or simply explaining what the agent got wrong.

A good tax professional is able to negotiate effectively

A good tax professional will not merely think about defending your position, but will also consider how to negotiate with the tax agent using overlooked deductions or tax breaks you may be entitled to. Incompetent tax professionals do too little in an audit. By being too passive they might lose legitimate deductions for you. If your tax professional fully explains your case to the tax agent, very often you would be granted additional deductions for which you are entitled.

Effective negotiation also entails what not to say. Greenhorn tax professionals may divulge too much information that may be irrelevant to the audit.

If you decide to hire a tax professional, you need to sign Form 2848 which gives your tax professional the right to represent you. Once you have done so, the tax agent cannot contact you personally but must contact your appointed tax professional.
